Israel Does Not Spy on the United States

The Lie

Israel is not a true U.S. ally because it spies on American entities.

The Truth

Israel, like many U.S. allies, has engaged in intelligence activity involving the United States—and the United States has likewise spied on Israel. Such activity is common among allied nations and has never altered bilateral alliances.

Background

- On **Nov. 20, 2025**, *The New York Times* reported that convicted Israeli spy **Jonathan Pollard** had met with U.S. Ambassador to Israel **Mike Huckabee**, triggering renewed criticism from anti-Israel activists.
- Pollard, a former U.S. intelligence analyst, served **30 years in prison** for passing classified documents to Israel in the 1980s. The incident strained US-Israel relations for years and Israel apologized for the affair.

Truth Explained

- Former Israeli Prime Minister **Naftali Bennett** stated on **Nov. 22, 2025** that Israel has **not conducted any operations on U.S. soil since the Pollard affair**, responding to claims that Jeffrey Epstein operated a blackmail scheme for Israel—an accusation Israel has repeatedly denied. “Megyn, you’re a decent and honest journalist. When this conspiracy theory first surfaced, that Israel supposedly used Epstein as an agent, I decided to check it out. After all, as Prime Minister I oversaw the Mossad, and if it were real, I would have likely known about this. So I checked with two former Mossad chiefs and another former Prime Minister whether anything like this had ever happened. No. It never happened. 100% untrue. Takeaway

Intelligence gathering among allies is common, reciprocal, and not evidence of hostility or a broken alliance. Israel’s intelligence activity toward the U.S. has been limited since the Pollard case, and the U.S. repeatedly conducted surveillance of Israel—as it has with many close partners.
